Fearful Behavior

Eyes: Open wide (whale eyes); dilated pupils

Ears: sideways; flattened against head

Mouth: closed, rapid panting; displacement behaviors (yawning, licking lips, sneezing)

Tail: held low or between legs (may be wagging)

Body posture: weight will be held back; may retreat; may roll over on back

If a dog is fearful:

- Stop all movement immediately
- Do not corner or touch the dog
- Quietly talk to the dog



- Avoid eye contact
- Quietly and slowly leave with sideways posture

IF You are Knocked Down

- Place hands In fists around neck and head for protection
- Remain In defensive posture until dog goes away or you are rescued

Respond Safely

If you are bitten:

- Call 911 and file a police report
- Seek medical attention and request documentation

Mr. Bugs' Dog Bite Prevention Program

Prevent Surprises

- Speak to the owner and ask if the dog has shown aggressive behavior
 - Ask that the dog is secured prior to entering
 - o If the owner refuses, do not enter the space
- Bring a barrier, such as a clipboard or satchel
- Bring a humane deterrent
 - Deterrents can be effective, but may not stop all animals
 - Citronella, air horns and compressed air make great deterrents



Arriving to the Premises

Before you approach:

- Check your surroundings
- Check for loose dogs
- Make noise
- Do not wear sunglasses
- Do not wear headphones

If a dog is present:

- Do not make sudden movements
- If owner is close, ask that the dog Is secured prior to entering the space
- If the owner refuses, return with a humane deterrent or call Hawaiian Humane at 808-356-2250

Remember: Most Dogs Don't Bite

Playful Behavior

But all dogs have the potential to bite

- It depends more on training, environment and situation than It does on their size or breed
- Approach all dogs with caution and respect

IF a Dog Attempts to Bite

- Stop and present an object for the dog to bite. Let the dog have the object as you retreat to safety
- Use a humane deterrent
- If you have no object to distract the dog:
 - Stand quietly
 - Place hands In fist around neck and head for protection
 - Quietly and slowly leave with sideways posture

Eyes: soft eyes; squinting; avoiding direct eye contact

Ears: held down; lose against head **Mouth:** open and panting; closed but relaxed

Tail: neutral; wagging side to side leisurely

Body posture: relaxed, not stiff; weight back (play bow)

If a dog is playful:

- Avoid eye contact
- Do not assume dog will remain playful
- Quietly and slowly leave with sideways posture

Dog Body Language

- Dogs communicate with their bodies
- Dogs signal intent and stress In many ways including:
 - Eyes
 - Ears
 - Mouth
 - Tail
 - Body posture
 - Learn dog body language to prevent dog bites



Prey Drive / Aggressive Behavior

Eyes: direct eye contact; hard stare
Ears: perked forward or erect
Mouth: tightly closed; may whine, bark, growl or snarl
Tail: held high; may rapidly wag
Body posture: tense or still; hackles raised

If a dog is in prey drive or aggressive:

- Stop all movement immediately
- Keep hands and arms close to body
- Quietly talk to the dog
- Put a barrier between you and the dog
- Avoid eye contact
- Quietly and slowly leave with sideways posture
